## Mark Johnson

Mark Johnson, one of the most popular and acclaimed horse racing commentators in Britain, joined an elite group in the spring of 2009 as only the sixth track announcer in Churchill Downs history. The only announcer to have called the action for both the Kentucky Derby and the Epsom Derby, Johnson brings a unique handicapping perspective to this year's Cup!

As far as track commentators go, he has been described as the complete package. "Mark's passion, descriptiveness, and knowledge of the sport make for a wonderful and entertaining combination," said John Asher, vice president of Communications of Churchill Downs.



## RACE 1

Taking a chance on a first time starter with Trini Boss in an interesting maiden race to open the Woodbine Mile Day card. The sire is a speedy/all-weather influence and this two-year-old is a son of the mare Supah Gem who won seven of her 24 career starts including the Grade 1 Santa Maria Handicap at Santa Anita, having previously finished a good fourth in the Breeders' Cup Juvenile Fillies. Five of her previous seven offspring to race have been winners. Although coming from a comparatively small barn it is one that can have them ready to go first time out.

The one they all have to beat is Victory Mast, who makes a comparatively quick reappearance following his length second on debut over seven furlongs. His barn hits at 15% second time out, and he once again gets the assistance of leading rider Luis Contreras, but that was a pretty hard race for a debut and it is possible that it could have just left its mark.

Trainer Mark Casse plays a powerful hand with his uncoupled pair and both look a "must use" on any ticket. Danzig Storm makes slightly more appeal as this \$300,000 son of Distorted Humor has been working lights out and gets the five pound weight break as an Ontario-bred. It looks significant that connections go for this slot to make his debut as the Woodbine condition book has two state-bred maiden special weights, over sprint distances, scheduled to go before the end of the month. Stablemate Quasar Power is out of a sprint stakes-winning mare but may be seen to better effect in the future on turf.

## RACE 2

This maiden claimer does not look as though it will take a great deal of winning and although it is open to horses from out of state it looks as if Ontario-breds may have a very strong hand. Chief's Edge drops in for a tag for the first time and although he has looked rather one-paced, over a variety of distances, so far in his career he looks capable of winning a maiden of this level. Off of the track for nearly eight months before his comeback fifth over six and a half furlongs in early July he has been working steadily and, more importantly, regularly since that effort and he should get a perfect toe through the early part of the race from the likely pace setter drawn to his inside Irish Donnie.

I would not be surprised if Irish Donnie hangs around for a piece of this as the form of his previous two starts on the all-weather track have worked out well (albeit in lower grades) and he did not run too badly when ridden by a relatively inexperienced apprentice on turf last time. Although he needs to step up on anything he has done to date, he does have the perfect post position to do just that. Another horse who steps up in grade is Jasper's Posse who runs first off of the claim for a new barn having had a brutally wide trip last time over this exact course and distance. He is far more exposed than most of the other major players in this field, but this is probably only the second time in his career that he has been legitimately in amongst similar rivals.

The non-Ontario-bred who may get involved in the finish is Eye of the World who drops back in for a tag off of a nine-month break. Trainer Mark Casse hits at about 28% with the MSW to Maiden Claiming angle, but I would be worried about this four-year-old son of English Channel dropping back in distance having never quiet reaching the leaders previously in races over a mile and a sixteenth and a mile and an eighth.

## RACE 3

This state-bred maiden looks like it could become a real war of attrition as very few of these appear to be bred for this kind of distance of ground. Looking for a bit of a price play and I hope we may get it with Bear's Clouseau. Although he finished behind four of his rivals here when he made his debut over seven furlongs at the end of last month he may be able to improve past that group. Having been slightly hampered at the start he made an eye catching middle move before flattening out in the stretch, but unlike many of the others in this race it appears two turns may bring out the best in him. Six of the eight horses his dam has put on the racetrack have won (including at stakes level) and it is also worth noting that his barn tends to do well with second time starters (they are about a 15% operation who hit about 13% of the time with second time starters).

Ticket to Glory finished five lengths in front of the top pick in that August 25th maiden race, but could now be primed for a big effort on the third career start. Worryingly he has been slowly away on both starts to date, but at least the two turns now give him more time to regroup. Stand Em Up has been a bit of a money burner to date having gone off favorite for his first two starts and having been under 5-1 in all four career appearances. Connections take blinkers off for the first time on the step up in distance from six furlongs to a mile and seventy yards. In a race lacking any serious pace it is just possible that Stand Em Up might get the run of the race in front which will make him very dangerous here. Milwaukee Flash finished second on his only career start to date (in a slightly slower run division of the same race contested by Bear's Clouseau et al on August 25th) but he can be expected to come on for that first experience.

## RACE 4

An unusual race to say the least on paper as we have a mix of non-winners of two and non-winners of three horses (three of them fit the latter condition) and there is a staggering lack of solid six furlong form with only two of the field having previously been successful over this common distance. Usually given these circumstances I would automatically want to pick a two-times winner with winning six furlong form (which would mean either Marchoso or Distortionist) but I just think that there are too many question marks about both of them and so I will go against my usual automatic play and tentatively put up Orion's Song as the most likely winner. Tactically this is also an intriguing race as there is not a great deal of early speed but several of these have dallied with the setting the pace in the past and I am hoping that several of these do that again here as Orion's Song definitely needs a bit of pace to fire at. His sole victory to date was a deep closing effort to win over seven furlongs here in July but he was able to sit a little closer to the pace last time out when a close fourth for open \$32,000 claiming over the same distance last time out. He has hit the board on three of the four occasions that he has tried six furlongs (including when twice second in high-end maiden claimers) and all of his best races have been when ridden by Euric Da Silva who is aboard him again.

Of the duo who exactly "fit the" bill Marchoso makes slightly more appeal having finished a close fourth in a similar race over five furlongs last time out. This will now be his second start for a high percentage barn. Distortionist is probably the one that they all have to beat as he managed to win in this grade (and therefore when out of condition) over seven





furlongs in August but then got beaten as the 4-5 favorite next time out for just \$10,000. He was claimed out of the Roger Attfield barn and that just leaves too many question marks. It is interesting that connections put blinkers on Myth Master for the first time here after he finished just ahead of the top pick over seven furlongs last time out. Given that he will once again be ridden by a five pound apprentice I wonder if they will try and be aggressive on the front end.

### RACE 5 - CANADIAN STAKES (GRADE 2)

#### 1 1/8 Miles on Turf For Fillies and Mares

Although Barefoot Lady, trained in Northern England by Richard Fahey, won this race twelve months ago overseas raiders do not have a great record in the Grade 2 Canadian Stakes and this year's renewal looks as if it will stay once again in North America. Many of these fillies and mares look quite closely rated given the weights here, but despite the fact that she has to give between four and thirteen pounds to her rivals Solid Appeal looks to have the most solid chance and makes the most appeal.

Solid Appeal carries top weight simply because she has already "been there, done that, and has the t-shirt" having already won the Grade 2 Nassua over a mile and the Grade 2 Dance Smartly over this exact course and distance earlier in the year. On the latter occasion she also carried top weight to victory conceding four pounds to the runner-up Julie's Love and six pounds to the third No Explaining. Since that victory she has gone on to be far from disgraced when sixth to Dank in the Grade 1 Beverly D at Arlington.

One would expect Solid Appeal to get a perfect trip here with La Tia likely to make the running from the outside post and Solid Appeal sitting in second. It was noticeable that in both of her previous wins at Woodbine this year, and indeed when she also won in the fall of 2012, she made a sweeping move to take the lead at the head of the lane and then knuckled down tenaciously when challenged down the long homestretch. Quite simply she just appears to be a horse who relishes this long, galloping Woodbine turf course and she is arguably a much better horse here than anywhere else.

Hypothetically strictly on the weights No Explaining has to be a danger as she is a further two pounds better off for her two and a half length defeat in the Grade 2 Dance Smartly, however listen out for the announcement of overweight as you can not expect John Velazquez to ride at 113 pounds. The other interesting angle with No Explaining is that she now gets Lasix for the first time on her 18th career start, and although the introduction of Lasix usually improves performance in younger horses, it is arguable that in older ones its immediate effect can often be negligible and even sometimes detrimental (*for example Bill Mott claimed that Lasix was the reason for Royal Delta's subpar performance in the Fleur de Lis at Churchill Downs and her two subsequent Grade 1 victories have been without Lasix*).

Last year's winning owner/trainer combination are represented this time by Ladys First who recently dead-heated for the Group 3 Atalanta Stakes over a mile at Sandown. Previous to sharing the spoils at Sandown she had finished third in the Listed Lyric Stakes at York, a race in which her stablemate, and last year's winner Barefoot Lady, had won on route to taking this prize. Last year in this piece we were all over Barefoot Lady at a juicy 7-1, but unfortunately having also called Ladys First on several occasions she just does not give me the same feel coming into this race. Basically her optimum distance is an easy mile and arguably the only reason that she dead heated at Sandown Park last time out was because the Sandown mile finishes steeply uphill through the final three furlongs.

Meri Shika, formerly trained in France, will be having her first run since moving to the Roger Attfield barn having reportedly only shipped from Europe about a week ago. Running here off a feather-weight, and on Lasix for the first time,



the only three-year-old in the field is an interesting player. At face value she was a chronic underachiever in her native France but she has managed to hit the board three times in Listed company already this year with arguably her best form coming on quick-ish ground by French standards. She is certainly bred to get this distance and it is just possible that North American conditions could enable her to “turn the corner” career-wise.

Trainer Michael Matz has sent out the winner of this race in 2009 with Princess Haya and he is doubly represented here with Minakshi and Colonial Flag. On Churchill Downs’ form last Fall, behind Centre Court, Colonial Flag is very closely matched with Solid Appeal but it is possible that the former French-trained Minakshi comes here with slightly stronger form and may be able to pick up a piece of it.

I am not sure that this is a race that greatly appeals on just a win bet, unless the price is right and I would not really want to be playing Solid Appeal simply as a win wager unless she was 3-1 or greater. It is possible that the value “win” play could be the first time off of the plane Meri Shika and she might be worth a small saver win and big show play at double digit odds simply given that she is the dark horse who could improve. This appeals far more as an exotic-play race and therefore I would box the top three selections in exactas and use the bottom three at the bottom of trifecta and superfecta tickets (keeping in mind the \$.20 trifecta and superfecta minimum wagers).

## RACE 6 – ONTARIO DERBY STAKES (GRADE 3)

### 1 1/8 Miles on Polytrack

I think that there is a good chance that this Grade 3 prize can remain in Canada as His Race to Win is the selection to beat Winning Cause. The Malcolm Pierce trained son of Stormy Atlantic certainly deserves to win a big prize on his home track and he will have no better chance than this. His nose second to Dynamic Sky (with subsequent Queen’s Plate winner Midnight Aria a length and a quarter behind him in third) could well be the linchpin for either an argument pro His Race to Win or anti His Race to Win. It is an extremely solid piece of form, and obviously it worked out in the Plate itself, but it is just slightly worrying that having taken the lead in deep stretch in that mile and an eight race he definitely faltered close home and got tagged. Therefore there is the question about his stamina. Stamina did not come into play in the Plate itself as he had an absolutely awful trip throughout and actually did well to finally finish sixth despite never having seriously been at the races. Given a month off he came back to beat his elders over a mile and a sixteenth here a month ago which he did with some authority from twelve rivals. My view is that he will stay this mile and an eighth distance fine, as he was probably beaten more by his wide post position rather than the distance itself in the Plate Trial and he should represent far better value than Winning Cause.

The Todd Pletcher trainee is already a Grade 3 winner on the Keeneland Polytrack, hence his four pound penalty here, but he has been beaten at a short price on both of his previous visits to Woodbine in Listed races and it is also possible that His Race to Win has more tactical speed than Winning Cause and may get first jump on him in a tactically run race.

Pyrite Mountain does not have a great deal to find with His Race to Win on Plate Trial form and he takes a turf to all-weather angle where he recently ran a good third in the 1 ½ mile Breeders’ Stakes. An end-to-end gallop would suit him best but he is unlikely to get that scenario here. Of the likely pace setters in the race Sky Commander, who is two for three on the Woodbine Polytrack, may hang around the longest.

In the expectation that Winning Cause will head the betting market His Race to Win should be legitimate value as a straight bet.

## RACE 7

Usually in Allowance Optional Claimers the first horses I put a line through are those which are in for a tag, but on this occasion the entry of Eastern Atlantic and Evil Kitten (both owned by the Tucci Stables and the only two fillies in this race in for a tag) represent an extremely solid entry. I like the way that their run styles complement each other with Eastern Atlantic likely to be a pace factor breaking from post position 3 while Evil Kitten is likely to stalk the pace from her outside post position – effectively post position 8. I would like to think that Eastern Atlantic would give a good lead to Evil Kitten into the race with the latter, who is two out of three over this 6 ½ furlong distance, and who had the class to finish a close second to Colonial Flag in a Grade 3 here on turf last year, the most likely winner.

In that Grade 3 turf race just over twelve months ago Evil Kitten finished a place ahead of Runfor Ro who drops back in distance having run twice around two turns so far this year. Runfor Ro could now be dangerous on her third run of the year and has been working lights out coming into this race. The fact that Johnny V has been attracted into the saddle only emphasizes that a big run should be expected.

Given her career statistics it is impossible to leave Lemon Splash out of the equation on the bottom of any exotic ticket while the unexposed Alythiela looks the type who may be seen to good effect on her first try at 6 ½ furlongs.

## RACE 8 - NORTHERN DANCER STAKES (GRADE I)

### 1 1/2 Miles on Turf

Well it is time to make a stand and I may as well make my position clear right from the getgo – I believe you have to take on Forte Dei Marmi again over 1 ½ miles. Last year in this preview I stated he “would not stay a mile and a half in horse box” and he was ridden to get the trip by Alex Solis but only managed to get third behind Wigmore Hall. Arguably this year’s race, with no Euro’s in it, is an easier race but my view still holds true. Yes Forte Dei Marmi won for the first time over 1 ½ miles here at Woodbine in early July, and it was on rain softened ground, but the bottom line is that it was one of the slowest mile and a half races that you will ever see and the final run time was a staggering 13 3/5th’s seconds slower than that clocked by Wigmore Hall in this race twelve months ago. Forte Dei Marmi, a son of a Champion Miller in Europe, is a mile and a quarter horse pure and simple and given a decent early tempo here he should not stay again.

The slight worry for those of us wanting to take on Forte Dei Marmi is that there is little strength in the opposition this year (by Grade 1 standards) and it is almost a race by which one has to come to a pick by process of elimination. So here goes – Perfect Timber was 6 ¼ lengths behind Forte Dei Marmi in that very slow Grade 3 Singspiel and has since been well beaten over 10 furlongs. He is out of a Woodman mare and therefore should not stay. Three-year-olds have a very bad record in this race which automatically turns me against Stormy Len in this race despite his decent second to Admiral Kitten in the Grade 1 Secretariat at Arlington last time. Stormy Len is also likely to be part of what may well be



quite a strong pace scenario by stayers' race standards with Turkish and Irish Mission likely to be right up there from the start. Turkish did not break his maiden until late June of this year when winning over 1 ¼ miles in a very slow time but he then stepped up on that performance markedly when taking an entry level allowance, over nine furlongs, next time out despite having to overcome the widest post position in a field of 11 and beating a next time out winner. He now gets Gary Stevens in the saddle but it is still a huge step up in grade for him here.

The filly Irish Mission is running in this race for the second time having finished fifth as a three-year-old twelve months ago. She was impressive when winning an open allowance, against fillies, here over 1M3F in July but was firmly put in her place behind Forte Dei Marmi in the Grade 2 Sky Classic Stakes last time. She may be the speed of the speed but she certainly will not enjoy an uncontested lead as she did when taking her allowance race two back. Hotep has only tried 12 furlongs once in his 28 race career and he is only one-for-14 on turf, so again there are stamina doubts with him.

And so, by process of elimination that leaves Hampstead Heath who has never tried 1 ½ miles before but who boasts solid Grade 2 form over shorter and who should be suited by this extreme distance given his breeding on both top and bottom. Having taken a second level AOC over 1 1/16th miles here in May he stepped up to finish second in the Grade 2 Nijinsky over a mile and an eighth in July and went on to finish 2 ¼ lengths second to Forte Dei Marmi in the Grade 2 Sky Classic over 1 ¼ miles last time out. Given that was a mile and a quarter race Forte Dei Marmi was ridden far more forward on that occasion and got first run on Hampstead Heath but it is unlikely that similar tactics will be employed here on the favorite and I could easily see Hampstead Heath coming out on top this time.

With Forte Dei Marmi put in as a morning line of 4/5 I would certainly be making a stand in multiple race wagers while keying him in the second and third positions in exotics. Given the projected odds on Hampstead Heath I would have a straight wager on him.

#### RACE 9

Quite a competitive state-bred entry level allowance in which Port Severn gets a narrow vote. Popular veteran rider Steven Bahen will have to work out a trip aboard this son of Niigon as he is unlikely to have the pace to hold a prominent inside position going into the first turn but this is a horse who definitely has a finishing kick, as he showed when breaking his maiden over seven furlongs on turf in June, and he certainly should be able to stay this additional distance of ground. It is also worth noting that on his only subsequent start since breaking his maiden he ran out of condition, in a non-winners of three lifetime allowance, over a mile on the turf and finished a creditable fourth of 11 in a seemingly strong race.

To his inside is Dance for Cole who is very much an unknown quantity as the last six of his seven career starts have all been on turf and his debut came on traditional dirt at Gulfstream. He showed little in that Gulfstream dirt start but his 1 1/16th mile turf maiden breaker here in July was achieved when making all of the running in a quick time. With leading rider Luis Contreras aboard he is in a perfect post position to be dangerous if he is able to transfer his turf speed to synthetic.

A little like the top pick Port Severn, Love to Battle is going to have to try and work out a trip from the inside post position given that he does not possess as much early pace as many others in the race, however although he possesses a career record of only one win from 14 starts he now boasts plenty of experience at the track and he has run to a consistent level of form in all five of his starts so far this year. It is difficult not to see him getting involved in the finish for minor awards.

### RACE 10 - WOODBINE MILE (GRADE I)

#### 1 Mile on the Turf

We all know the record of Wise Dan and what he has achieved but to start off here are just a couple of other snippets which you might not have heard before – Wise Dan is bidding to become the first ever horse to win the Ricoh Woodbine Mile twice, trainer Charles LoPresti is bidding to win this for the third time straight (2011 with Turallure), and Johnny V has ridden the winner of this race a record three times.

It is arguable that the reigning Horse of the Year has been workmanlike rather than spectacular in his last two victories at Churchill Downs and Saratoga, but given his weights, ground conditions, and inside draws, he has won despite circumstances working against him – the sign of a true champion. Most international weights handicappers have Wise Dan between 10 and 14 pounds clear of his nearest rival in this field so yes he should win conceding just three pounds to most of the other major players, but for me the more intriguing aspect of this race is how he will perform given a likely stronger early tempo. One would hope, and with Dimension in the race it is likely to occur, that this race should be run nearer to the kind of fractions posted in last year's Grade 1 Breeders' Cup Mile at Santa Anita, when they clicked off the half mile in 46.16 and stopped the clock in 1:31.78.

Take a look at the win of Dimension in the Grade 2 Play the King Stakes over seven furlongs at the end of last month. He rattled off 22.24 for the quarter and an eye popping 44.26 for the half. Granted he only had to carry 117 pounds that day (while the Breeders' Cup Mile contenders had to lump 126 pounds at Santa Anita) but the likely pace should see the cream rise to the top, so this time there will be no excuses if Wise Dan does not impress in the victory.

Dimension is a very interesting horse in the context of this race and the fact that he has been put in as the 10-1 fourth favorite on the morning line certainly appeals as the horse to use underneath the champion. He was a decent handicapper in Great Britain, narrowly failing to hit the board in the Royal Hunt Cup at Royal Ascot when trained by James Fanshaw, and he left Britain with an official rating of 98. He struggled with the tight turns of Keeneland and Churchill Downs since his arrival in the United States, but he loved the long, galloping stretch of Woodbine and posted a personal best performance, one which the international weights handicapper believed merited being raised seven pounds up to 105. So there is still a yawning chasm between Dimension and Wise Dan – the former rated between 128 and 132 depending on which ratings you follow – but Dimension is certainly progressive for his rookie trainer Conor Murphy and if he plays the hare again here few will be able to catch him.

Top European mile form is represented here with the Dave Simcock trained five-year-old Trade Storm who won the Group 2 Zabeel Mile at Meydan on Super Saturday in March. Since his arrival back in Britain he has been locking horns with some of the best milers in Britain having finished a close fifth at Royal Ascot and last time out finishing third in the Group 2 Celebration Mile at Goodwood behind Afsare – last year's Arlington Million runner-up. That is hardly top European mile form and Trade Storm's place in the Euro miler's hierarchy is better judged on his penultimate start when he was eight lengths fourth in the Group 1 QUIPO Sussex Stakes behind Toronado, Dawn Approach, and Declaration of War. So to be fair he is not a leading European light and, if you will excuse me, I will crunch just one more set of figures – last year Britain's Cityscape finished third in this race to Wise Dan when officially rated 125 in Britain, Trade Storm comes into this race officially rated only 115 in Britain.





Second favorite on the morning line is Christophe Clement's Za Approval who looks like another horse who will be suited by a strong early gallop, however connections have made no secret of the fact that they really want very fast ground for this horse to be seen at his very best and given this week's weather in Ontario you must have your doubts about whether those optimum underfoot conditions will prevail. On his balance of form he is probably about the same level of horse as Dimension, but I think that there are slightly more question marks over him.

Riding the River is running in this race for the third time (he was fifth and fourth in the previous two renewals), but it looks like third is probably the best he can achieve this time around and Escaper split Dimension and Riding the River when second in the Play the King Stakes last time. That was his best career performance since finishing second in the 2011 Breeders' Cup Juvenile turf.

Given the likely odds, I would play mainly exactas using Wise Dan and Dimension and would put 80% of my stake on a straight Wise Dan-Dimension exacta, and the other 20% on a Dimension-Wise Dan exacta. For a little bit of fun I would throw a few bucks at trifectas with Wise Dan on top and Dimension and Trade Storm boxed underneath in the second and third positions – keeping in mind that if conditions come up unexpectedly wet or yielding Trade Storm's chances will be increased while Dimensions will be hampered.

#### RACE 11

This looks an excellent chance for the four-year-old Stormy Connection to belatedly break his maiden at the sixth attempt. Having shown little bits of form as a three-year-old he appears to have improved in his two starts this year with a third over five furlongs early last month and then a staying on 1  $\frac{3}{4}$  length second over six furlongs just three weeks ago. Breeding wise he looks well worth trying over seven furlongs and it is good to see Emma-Jayne Wilson keeping the faith as it is likely that she could have also ridden Csonka in this event.

Csonka is himself a major player here but probably has more questions to answer. He was completely unfancied when flashing speed and finishing second of 13 on his 6  $\frac{1}{2}$  furlong debut in July but was then backed down to favoritism only to stop abruptly next time out over seven furlongs on turf. With little speed to his inside he is interesting now returning to the all-weather with Luis Contreras aboard.

Both Jobber Bill and Take It All have finished second three times during their careers and both once again look must use material on the bottom side of exotic tickets.
